Speech and Language Provision



Developing our Curriculum

The School Improvement team continues to work with curriculum leaders across the schools to create our Trust Curriculum which allows schools to build from the overall Intent and structure into their own school's bespoke curriculum. The 2019 OFSTED framework encourages school leaders to consider their curriculum carefully, ensuring that it reflects the needs of their pupils and the values of their school, whilst being grounded in the high standards of the National Curriculum. Once confident that the structures for this are in place within the school, it is crucial that this can be translated into the classroom through effective planning and quality first teaching. Only then can we be confident that our children will be making the progress they need to make.



The new approach: a focus on building children's knowledge, ensuring that they know more, remember more and can do more as a result of our teaching. This is a whole school curriculum and not just a year group one. Therefore understanding our place in our children's learning journey for each subject is key.

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Spotlight on Early Years



Led by Sophie Chaloner, our Early Years Leaders, Rebecca (Brettenham),Cidgem (Fleecefield), Aimee (Galliard) and Hatice (Raynham) are already working very well together. Changes are afoot in Early Years with the new statutory EYFS framework and the new statutory Reception Baseline Assessment both

coming in from September 2021. In addition, new Development Matters guidance which much of EY assessment is based on, has also been produced, coming into effect from September. This will keep our team busy but, through working together, we will hopefully be able to lighten the load. Significant work has also been completed to develop our curriculum within EY to create a well-planned and sequenced journey that links to



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the rest of the school.
